FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

"Chadesh Yamenu Ke'kedem" – Restore us as in days of old Shalom friends.

I saw a clip of a stand-up comic mocking the phrase, "New and Improved." How can something new be improved? If it has been improved, then there was an old version and it's not new! Which one is it, new or old?

While I appreciate the humorous semantic argument, the concept of something both new and old isn't confusing to me as a Jew coming into the season of High Holidays and beginning the calendar afresh on Rosh Hashanah. We reach the same point each year, with the summer having waned, kids returning to school, and routines setting back in. In synagogue on Rosh Hashanah familiar melodies will be sung, the Rabbi will give a sermon, and we'll hear the sound of the shofar, just as has been before. We live out and recite traditions that go back through the ages.

Yet at the same time we can appreciate that these old, and even ancient, Jewish ways are given new vitality through the modern connections and energy we pour into them. We reinvigorate our services in many ways when we gather communally. The psalms from the bible are thousands of years old, and their inclusion as part of our prayer liturgy has been set for a millennium. Still we read them with thoughtful modern translations and sing them with contemporary melodies. We restore deep meaning on a personal level to the words of our prayer books when we intone prayers like Avinu Malkeinu, whose words were penned by the Talmud's famous Rabbi Akiva, and infuse them with our personal needs, desires, and requests. Thus we make the old words new again in our mouths.

Most strikingly, Rosh Hashanah is marked for us as a transition moment when we ourselves can become new. The 11th century sage, Maimonides, writes in his Laws of Repentance that we have the opportunity and ability to improve who we are and in doing so make ourselves new. He writes that the teshuvah we are supposed to do at this point in the year changes us, "as if to say, I am someone different. I am no longer the person who did those [wrong] things" (Mishneh Torah, Hilchot Teshuvah 2:4). The goal of Rosh Hashanah is to be both new and improved as individuals. The experiences and path of the person we used to be, met with intention of who we want to be, gives shape to the new person we will be.

At the Forest Hills Jewish Center, there is a lot of "new" happening. For instance, I'm very excited to be your new rabbi. For some it is still new to be leaving our homes again to synagogue "post pandemic." New classes and programs for all ages are in the works for the coming year. New faces have walked through our doors this summer. We even have new paint to beautify our sanctuary. Still, because we have the teachings of Rosh Hashanah from which to learn, I find it comforting to know that everything new is exactly as we see for the psalms, services, and ourselves. That is to say, the new in our community is coming with a purpose of strengthening and enriching the beloved traditions and values of the FHJC. It is part of our mission as the Jewish people to renew ourselves, to learn and to

I wish for you this year that you find new and improved connections with the people and places long dear to your heart. I pray for the new year to bring good health and joy to your home. And I look forward to going from being your new rabbi to old friends.

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NOTES FROM THE HAZZAN

When I study the liturgy with students and congregants, a common reaction has been how, when closely examined, many prayers written in antiquity still feel fresh and relevant, as if our ancestors are speaking to us through the collective wisdom of generations. Despite the many changes we see and feel around us in the world, the basic human condition, and our most basic spiritual needs, have largely remained the same. Three themes of the High Holiday prayers stick out in this regard:

We are not in control of everything. The emphasis on Rosh Hashana, in particular, is God's sovereignty, the idea that God is ultimately the one who created us and indeed the world, and the universe will unfold in a way that is largely out of our hands. During the *Un'taneh Tokef* prayer we confront our own fragile mortality, asking "How many will pass on, and how many will be born. Who will live and who will die?"

We can change. "Ut'shuva, ut'fillah, u'tzedakah." Our changing, our prayers, and our righteousness have the power to transform our destiny. *Teshuva* involves self critique and a resolve to act in line with our principles. Yes, much is out of our control, but these three divine aspects of humanity have been, and will continue to be, the ways in which we can determine what sort of world we live in going forward.

Compassion. The Hebrew word for compassion is the most common word found in the High Holiday Machzor. In the *Untaneh Tokef* prayer, God is depicted as a judge. But the rabbinic understanding of God is specifically as a compassionate judge, so much so that our sages teach that when the balance of one's deeds are in question, God removes a misdeed from the scale of justice, essentially giving us the benefit of the doubt. Our tradition thus encourages us to show greater compassion for one another, and for ourselves.

During the coming year, may we have the humility to approach the sacred through the wisdom of generations, and may we be able to connect to our world and to our fellow human beings with grace and compassion.

However, the majesty and awe of our tremendous Sanctuary is surely enhanced and very noticeable when it's properly maintained.

So that we can continue to maintain and take pride in our beloved Foerst Hills Jewish Center, please be generous during the upcoming Kol Nidre Appeal. Rae and I wish you all a very joyous and happy New Year. May it bring good health and success to all of us.

ADULT EDUCATION Judy Gostl and David Snyder

The **Hebrew Literature Group** will kick off this year's Adult Education schedule. On **Thursday, October 12** at 5:00PM, The group will Zoom together to complete the discussion of the book of *Job*. Dan Kob will head this presentation which will be entirely in English on some of the literary adaptations of the book of *Job*. During the rest of this year, The Hebrew Literature Group will devote itself to an exploration of the changes in the Hebrew language from the First Temple period leading up to the Mishnaic period. Mishnaic Hebrew is not as complex as the Hebrew of earlier periods. The Group will look at literature that demonstrates these changes including Ecclesiastes (*Koheleth*), Maccabees I, writings from the Dead Sea Scrolls, as well as first temple period writing as a point of comparison, and Mishnaic Hebrew itself. This should be fascinating. Please see Mitchell's note below for more information!

Adult Education here at FHJC will see some changes. Some of our **Shabbaton at Home** lectures will move back to in-person presentations on Shabbat after Kiddush and some will remain on Zoom in the evenings. We have new teaching volunteers who have never been part of this program before and we look forward to hearing from them. We are a fortunate congregation to have so many people who have solid Jewish backgrounds who are willing to share with us.

We also have a new program: **History Readers Book Club**. This idea came to us from Regina Geber. This group will meet on Zoom every other month. At each meeting, the group will decide on its next book together. But the first book for this group has been chosen by Regina. It will be *The Betrayal of the Duchess: The Scandal That Unmade the Bourbon Monarchy and Made France Modern* by Maurice Samuels. History Readers book group's first meeting will be **Thursday, November 9** at 8:00PM on Zoom.

We are still soliciting new ideas from our FHJC members and teachers (both our regulars and new people). We hope to have the program set by the end of the High Holidays. Watch for fliers, postings in eShabbat Shalom, and future editions of the *Message*.



HEBREW LITERATURE GROUP Mitchell Frank

The Hebrew Literature Group is preparing its program for the coming year. We will begin with a tip of the cap to our 5783 season which was dedicated to a reading of the biblical book of *Job* through the new translation by Edward Greenstein. On **Thursday, October 12, 2023 at 5 pm**, via Zoom, Dan Korb will present a session on world literature, theater and film that draws from the book of *Job*. The presentation will be in English. Prepare to be fascinated!

Our theme for the coming year (as it stands now) is the development of the Hebrew language during the second temple period. That historical period, from about 500 BCE to roughly 100 CE, was an amazing era by any standard. It started with the first Zionist movement, involving the return of exiles from Babylon (as commemorated in Psalm 126 - the *Shir HaMaalot* that we sing before Grace After Meals on Shabbat and holidays). At that stage, the Hebrew language was as rich as it was during the period of Kings. But over time our biblical language became interspersed with other languages, from Persian and Aramaic to Greek, becoming diluted and somewhat transformed. Several stages along the way lead up to what is termed Mishnaic Hebrew, and we will follow the progress of that train with stops along the way including (but not limited to) the biblical book of *Koheleth* (Ecclesiastes), psalm-like poems from the *Essenes* unearthed in the Dead Sea scrolls, and the *Mishna* itself.





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
