FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

A Very Fond Farewell

Having been reminded by Karen Stein, our *Message* editor, that it was time to submit an article for the upcoming issue, it suddenly dawned upon me that this would be my final opportunity to address you all in this format. My tenure at the FHJC ends as of June 30, and a new era is about to begin...

People often ask me what I'm feeling as I approach that day, and I think I can safely say that I am the walking, talking incarnation of "mixed emotions." I cannot deny that there is a piece of me- a significant piece- that eagerly anticipates being free of the responsibilities that have essentially defined the contours of my life for more than forty years. Other than my marriage and, with Robin, raising our four children, this synagogue and community have occupied not only my time, but also my focus and energy over literally decades. I don't think it's widely understood that most working people don't live where they work. They go to work, put in their hours, and go home, away from the workplace. It doesn't work like that for most clergy people, who very much live where they work. My home has been an extension of my office (and vice versa) for what feels like forever, and over time, that takes a definite toll. And, of course, technology like smart phones has made it impossible to "be away" even when you're actually away. So it would be disingenuous for me to pretend that leaving that behind is not a very appealing prospect.

But of course, that said, beyond my biological family, the Forest Hills Jewish Center has in every sense been my family for all these years. It's hard to write these sentences without having them sound cliché, but really- we have laughed together, cried together, celebrated together, mourned together, travelled together, studied and learned together, raised our children together,

and on and on and on. There is literally no end to the degree of our interconnected-ness, and that truth has, in no small measure, been the reason why this partnership of rabbi (and family) and synagogue has been such a great success. This kind of relationship is what both rabbis and synagogues pray for. Rabbis desperately want a synagogue that will respect and honor them and treat them well, and synagogues want the same from their rabbis (and cantors). It doesn't happen all that often that one rabbi stays with the same congregation for his entire, 42-year pulpit career. It doesn't happen because it's hard to find the right cast of characters. I've been a very fortunate rabbi indeed to hang my rabbinic hat in Forest Hills for all these years, but I'd like to think (with all appropriate modesty) that the synagogue has been fortunate as well. It's been a great marriage.

So...

I think the proper way to sign off is not to say goodbye, but rather Shalom Ul'hitra'ot...goodbye, and hope to see you soon. As I've said to countless people, West Orange, NJ is not in Europe, and you can get there from here (and we can get here from there!). We have every intention of remaining a part of the Forest Hills Jewish Center family even as we find a new home, physical and spiritual. We'll miss you all, and what we wish for you is what we wish for ourselves... good health, good times, and many reasons to celebrate together. Thanks for the memories, and so much more...

NOTES FROM THE HAZZAN

Growing up in sunny Akron, Ohio, I remember well how the springtime Shabbatot were packed with B'nei Mitzvah celebrations. On account of the snowy winters, the weeks between Pesach and the onset of summer featured a Bar or Bat Mitzvah nearly every week, with readings and divrei-Torah from the book of Vayikra, known in English as Leviticus.

The book of Leviticus is referred to in our tradition by the name "Torat Kohanim," or "instructions for the Priests." At first blush studying, and reading from these verses of Torah, dealing with such topics as sacrifices, initiation of the Aaronide priesthood, the performance of the sacred rite, and ritual purity, may seem a bit daunting for a 13 year-old to tackle in preparation for a bar mitzvah. These chapters, though, also contain laws dealing with Kashrut, Yom Kippur, the Holiness Code, and the famous injunction in Chapter 19 to "Love your neighbor as yourself" - all vital information to understanding the instructions that would eventually become not just a guide for the priesthood, but for the entire Jewish nation. Traditionally, a child's Torah study would begin with the book of Vayikra. There is another overall theme of Vayikra that connects to the B'nai Mitzvah more directly: an emphasis on the importance of ritual. In the words of Rabbi Ismar Schorsch, "ritual is a way of giving voice to ultimate values. Each of us needs a sense of holiness to navigate the relentless secularity of our lives."

At just thirteen years of age, a young Jewish person is obviously not really yet a "man" or a "woman." And yet, in celebrating and ritualizing B'nei Mitzvah, we are marking an important moment in the life of a child, and in the life of his or her family. Though we know that a young person does not yet have, and is not capable of, all of the responsibilities of an adult, at thirteen years old we nonetheless begin to bestow the moral and ethical responsibilities of our religion upon our young people. Through this ritual we begin the process of acknowledging the child as a unique individual within our community with responsibilities and privileges. No longer is he or she to be seen as a mere appendage of his or her parents, but viewed by the community as someone who is responsible in their own right for the fruits of their labors: for their shortcomings and achievements alike.

According to rabbinic tradition, the age of understanding is what determines the age of responsibility. This notion of obligation and liability traces back to Adam and Eve partaking of the tree of knowledge in the Garden of Eden. We mark this transitional stage in life by a ritual in order to signify the onset of understanding: a cognitive maturity that is connected to the onset of one's physical maturity. The Bar Mitzvah, then, is the age at which, according to Rabbi David Kraemer, we become "beings with a knowledge that is (or, at least, ought to be) mature enough to distinguish between good and evil."

As in the book of Vayikra, in the public observance of this milestone we focus on certain ritual mitzvot, essential to our tradition, that center around the Torah: the ability to read from the Torah and our other sacred texts (Haftarah) in public, showing understanding of the texts by teaching something about them to the community and their peers (d'var Torah) and also, if possible, the ability to serve as a shaliach tizibbur, an emissary of the congregation, leading the community in the sacred prayer ritual that further strengthens our connection to the divine. May this spring and the ensuing summer, as we mark our own transitions in life, be a time of ongoing joy and continued commitment to our Jewish values and tradition.

But if you visit us any day of the week these days, you will again hear the pitter patter of our children around the building. And although there have been changes in our operation, the pulse of life returned to our community. Life almost feels normal again! We have reclaimed many of our pre-pandemic activities. And although the impact of the pandemic is and always will be underlying everything that we do, we boldly resumed

some of our traditional activities in person: Shabbat services, High Holiday services, modified weekly minyanim, Purim Carnival, Dinner Dance, Tennis Outing, Second Seder and the list goes on and on. This year, we are even celebrating Israel's 75 birthday with an in person Zimriya again!

When Hazzan Rosenblum announced his retirement two years ago, we hired Hazzan Levin to be our *Shliach Tzibur* and when Rabbi Skolnik announced his retirement in June of 2023 we embarked on a Rabbi Search and are about to hire Rabbi Graber as our new Rabbi. And it has only been three years!!!

So as I am about to become another past president, the relief is mixed with some sadness. We are definitely at an end of an era. Our Rabbi of 42 years is retiring. We are about to change our physical location and a new lay leadership is about to take over.

I hope that you continue to extend the support you showed me and my Executive Board to the new incoming leadership.

I am also sure that you join me in wishing Robin and Rabbi Skolnik a Healthy, Happy and Fruitful retirement. *Tzetchem LeShalom*.

NEWS FROM NURSERY SCHOOL

The Forest Hills Jewish Center Early Childhood Program's mission is to provide a complete, wellbalanced education to our littlest learners. Our educational philosophy, based on the Reggio Emilia approach to education, includes a set of beliefs and core values that all children are unique and must have a supportive, stimulating, and educational environment where they can develop mentally, emotionally, and socially. Our Reggio Emilia-inspired practices are anchored by our understanding of children as being capable, eager to explore, competent, and full of wonder and delight. The Jewish Early Childhood Education Initiative (JECEI) applied a Jewish perspective to the Reggio concepts, and over 10 years ago, we started on our Reggio Emilia Journey and have incorporated these concepts into the Forest Hills Jewish Center Early Childhood Program.

These concepts include:

Divine Image/ Tzelem Elohim - dignity and potential

Reggio's central value—an image of the child as capable—mirrors the idea that every individual is created in the image of G-d. The entire school community honors everyone's uniqueness and diversity is celebrated. Children are provided with the opportunity to explore and express themselves through "Reggio's hundred languages," including music, movement, writing, art, stories, dramatic play, cooking, games, discussions, block play, physical education, and nature.

Holy Space/ K'dusha - intentionality and presence

We endeavor to create beautiful and sacred spaces for our children. This is reflected in our classrooms where materials, books, nature and Jewish traditions are honored. Families come together to appreciate the blessing of having a community.

Interpretation/ *D'rash* - **inquiry, dialogue, and** productive years of learning that lie ahead. **transmission**

We have a rich culture of inquiry and dialogue. In Reggio, educators believe that the documentation of these processes is powerful. Our entire staff engages in meaningful documentation of children's work in an effort to share what transpires in the classroom and give honor to children's creativity.

Journey/ *Masa* - reflection, return and renewal

History is ripe with examples of famed journeys. We believe in the power of the journey, and so we allow children the time to journey toward their own conclusions in their own way. It is clearly understood that each child is a unique individual with his/her own pace of development that must be considered and respected at all times.

Covenant/ *B'rit* - belonging and commitment

We believe that the relationships we, as educators, forge with our families are what enable each of us—parent, teacher, and child—to achieve our divine potential.

Awakening and Awareness/ Hitorerut - amazement and gratitude

We advocate a playful, relaxed, non-pressured environment rich in experiences that foster imagination, curiosity, creativity and independence. We seek to stimulate children's natural sense of amazement, wonder and joy of discovery.

Repairing the World/ *Tikkun Olam* (Repair of the World) - responsibility

We are all obligated to walk the world mindfully. We teach all of our children to act with kavod – respect; to realize their responsibilities toward one another and the earth.

Our educators cultivate the children's love of learning by encouraging them to become confident, independent, responsible and creative thinkers. Our children build a solid foundation for moving forward while each child grows at their own pace. Obviously, no two children are alike and our school community honors and celebrates everyone's uniqueness. Our amazing educators help ensure the productive years of learning that lie ahead.

Anti-Semitism - Don't Be Afraid to Talk About It

Recently Rabbi Skolnik joined our 5th -7th graders before minyan for a session of "Ask The Rabbi." Surprisingly the students did not want to ask about the Passover story. They were not looking for answers to the big questions, like why is there evil in the world. They weren't even remotely interested in what is going on in Israel. They wanted to talk about anti-Semitism.

Some students related personal incidents with classmates. Some had heard about the local vandalism. Many wanted to understand why people are anti-Semitic; where did this bigotry come from? What was clear was that the students wanted a way to address their experiences and concerns.

Rabbi Skolnik patiently and directly answered these questions and concerns, reassuring students that FHJC is a safe place for this conversation and that no one deserves to be treated poorly especially because of their religion. He clarified that not all Christians are anti-Semetic and that the Catholic church has changed its teachings about Judaism and Jews. He also spoke warmly of his relationships with local clergy of other faiths and their support for him as a Jewish leader and of their Jewish neighbors. He was a great model for discussing anti-Semitism with children.

Talking to children about charged, difficult or sensitive topics can seem intimidating. However, not talking about them is worse; it sends the message that these topics are too scary to be handled even by their parents. Experts suggest that you check in with your child and validate their emotions. For instance, if you hear a news story together about anti-Semitism you can ask your child how she feels about it or what emotions it brings up. You can assure him that it is understandable to feel angry, afraid or any other way. Encourage questions. Clarify any misconceptions or misinformation and reassure them that many people are not anti-Semitic. Remember that there is nothing wrong with saying you don't know or calmly expressing your own emotions.

Making a plan as to how to respond to anti-Semitic comments is also recommended. You can practice responses with your child such as "What an unkind thing to say." "Excuse me? Could you repeat that?" or "I disagree with you, and here's why..." Brainstorm with trusted adults in their clubs, teams or schools whom they can turn to address any hateful situations that might arise.

Finally, keep the conversation going. This is not a 'one and done' talk. Unfortunately, your child may have to confront anti-Semitism in high school and college, too.




