FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

The Spirituality of BBQ

With summer upon us, the usual trappings will accompany it including Stadium concerts, water fights, beach days, and, of course, barbecues. As Americans it is typical (though not obligatory) to celebrate many American holidays with grilling and cookouts, including Memorial Day, Juneteenth, and the Fourth of July. Whether you put on veggie burgers or steaks, burn gas or charcoal, firing up the grill is a beloved seasonal activity for more than just the tasty food.

As our Men's Club knows well, a barbecue is a great way to gather people and have a good time. Yes, people come for food, but like at kiddush we are really coming to be together, and to celebrate the opportunity to do so. On the American BBQ holidays we use togetherness and food to celebrate the freedom we have and express gratitude for it. In that way, it is not so different from the large amounts of cooked meat that was shared around at the festivals in the ancient Temple, expressing gratitude and freedom through gathering. When you are enjoying something from the grill this summer, feel free to picture yourself in Jerusalem.

In addition to the joyful atmosphere, the act of barbecuing also has some hidden lessons for our Jewish selves:

1) "These burgers aren't going to cook themselves" – Just like a BBQ needs a grillmaster to light the flame, keep an eye on the food, and intervene when needed, a life of meaningful Judaism needs the same. We need to seek out a chance to have a passion for Torah ignited, make sure we have something of substance in the works, and be ready to adjust. How will you keep your flame lit this summer? You could take some time to prepare Shabbat, or look for a synagogue on your trip to Mumbai, and bring a Jewish book to the beach. We also can always find ways to give of our time and money to the repair of the world.

2) Rare or Well done? – Even if everyone is going to have a burger, everyone is having it their way. Maybe rare and with pickles, or maybe burnt to a korban-worthy crisp. Even in the same synagogue, each person will experience Judaism in a way that is

flavored by their family, other communities they have been a part of, and the journey that led them to now. Diversity is a necessary and positive result of coming together. Just as we are in relationship with our friend who I think has too much ketchup (or not enough), we can be in relationship with our fellow Jews who do it a little differently.

5) It doesn't all cook the same way – Hot dogs, wings, steak, corn, peppers, salmon, tofu...they can all go on the grill, but it's not just the diners that will be different. They need different amounts of preparation and time on the fire. Well, the Jewish actions and events we build into our lives also take different preparation and time. Sometimes it's a filling brisket-style Saturday morning service. But Jewish action can also be more of a one-bite slider, pairing nicely with saying borei pri hagafen over a glass of pool-side sangria.

However you get fired up this summer, remember to bring your spirituality with you, and enjoy!

NOTES FROM THE HAZZAN

I was fortunate to travel to Minneapolis last month to attend the 77th Annual Cantors Assembly Convention – an emotional, thought–provoking, and rejuvenating experience. In addition to the daily learning tracks on repertoire, self–care and professional development, this year's convention also focused on the state of World Jewry, Judaism in America and the subsequent roles that clergy now play in synagogue life and beyond.


Our annual meeting began with a keynote address delivered by Yizhar Hess, Chair of the World Zionist Organization. That evening normally would have featured a concert, but instead our delegation attended a special presentation by Noa Tishby, who spoke on the history of the conflict in Israel and its portrayal in the media. In another year we may have lamented having one less major concert, but this year the choice to focus on Israel affairs struck just the right chord (feel free to connect with me to discuss the content of these presentations).

The convention was, of course, still full of musical moments. The opening concert, "Chadesh Yameinu," focused predominantly on contemporary Jewish music in the singer/songwriter modality. A wonderful daytime showcase of Hazzanut and Classical music demonstrated both the relevance and importance of preserving traditional Jewish music, and the great variety of musical expression in the classical form. A second "musical showcase" featured pop and Broadway melodies, while the third evening brought a Gala Concert of World Premier Compositions, as we traveled to one of the large local synagogues to perform (to a packed house) new music. The final concert perfectly bookended the convention, with "Shirei Tefillah – Prayersongs: Contemporary Israel Songs as Tefillah." It was an appropriately emotional

musical ending to a transformative week of spiritual and professional growth.

I look forward to sharing these musical experiences and lessons in more detail in the coming months (and most especially as we work toward an exciting concert of Jewish music this coming fall!). Beyond the details, however, I am compelled to share a bit about the overall experience of attending the convention. In four short days the convention managed to encapsulate a beautiful example for congregational life - particularly as we continue to refine (and hopefully embody) our core values, and evolve as a welcoming, inclusive community here in Forest Hills. Yes, the CA conventions are meticulously planned, and informative, but they are also a source of validation for the notion that we can be our best selves in the context of a community. The convention serves as a sacred time and place where we cantors are somehow able to be our full selves in Jewish, musical, and human expression, while at the same time celebrating, and enjoying, each other's talents. As one of my peers noted, the Cantors Assembly has the capacity to serve as a second family: a real place of love and support where a person can "make mistakes, seek out a new identity and practice self exploration." A sense of belonging and of self worth is surely intrinsic to a Jewish community, and also essential to our spiritual health. And while a great performance can indeed be a miraculous blessing, it doesn't provide half the satisfaction that we receive from the knowledge that we are holy and precious to one another. May we all enjoy the gift of being in such a community, and experience a ta'am of the sweet singers of Israel.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

What A Year!

It's hard for me to believe that June marks the completion of my first year as President of Forest Hills Jewish Center. And what an incredible year it has been!

A lavish Kiddush that was planned for Rabbi Skolnik's retirement turned into an exercise in how quickly we could evacuate the building as acrid fumes filled the Sanctuary. The cause turned out to be a badly worn fan belt on a blower motor, not an actual fire, and once the Fire Department checked out the building we were able to continue services and then enjoy the kiddush – but not before we had our first Sermon on The Stoop.

The summer saw our lower level flooded by rainstorms and a broken drainpipe. Heroic efforts by our Maintenance staff and an exceptionally agile plumber had us back up within a couple of days. The High Holidays came, and we were able to observe them in a freshly plastered and repainted Sanctuary, befitting the solemnity of the Days of Awe.

In November, Mayor Adams visited and addressed the efforts his administration was making to ensure the safety and security of Jewish New Yorkers. Though it was heartening to hear the mayor, recent events on college campuses and public venues have shown us how deep-seated and pervasive antisemitism is in the U.S.

The cold weather can bring a different set of problems for an aging structure like our building, but it can also make us more attractive to wildlife of Forest Hills that are looking for a temporary home. Rocky Racoon thought he'd found a nice, warm, comfortable place in FHJC to pass the winter. Fortunately, it took little time for a professional to discover his hideaway and remove Rocky from the premises. (I don't know where he's currently residing, so I can't forward any cards or letters.)

And though the hardy members of Con Ed provide a valuable service that maintains our power and comfort, once in a great while they make an "oops" – as on the Shabbat morning that Con Ed workers on 69th Road hit the wrong electrical main and cut power to all our systems, including lights, heating, elevators and phones. We put on coats and began services using ambient light in the Sanctuary, but we were in the dark (pun intended!) about setting up the ballroom for a nice kiddush to follow services. Fortunately, shortly before 10:00 am power was restored, and we all gave thanks and continued services as the lights came on and the building began to warm up.

I can't know what challenges and joys the coming year will bring but I'm looking forward to them and I plan to do everything I can to help strengthen the congregation and ensure FHJC continues to be warm and welcoming. May all the hostages be freed speedily and reunited with their loved ones, may you have a wonderful summer, and may we all merit to welcome the High Holidays together in the fall.

We have been through a lot together. Reflecting back I see an abundance of blessings that I have received in my years at FHJC.

I was excited by the wonderful things that Lynn Lancaster had told me about the FHJC Religious School. And then there was the engagement piece. At my job interview for the position of Director of Education and Engagement, I asked what successful engagement would look like. I was met with a pregnant pause and a palpable communal question mark. Luckily that was accompanied by the blessing of a willingness to experiment, grow and learn.

In my first year, I set about getting the lay of the land. I quickly saw that my niece, Sarah, was right. She had told me that the teachers really cared about the students. These caring, supportive interactions were visible in every minyan, class and program. That became a touchstone for me. And I have been blessed to work with teachers, seasoned and new, who ensure that FHJC continues to prioritize the teacher-student relationship.

I have also been blessed that parents at FHJC are passionate partners with the Religious School. They care deeply what gets taught and how it gets taught and I learned to listen and trust their judgment. They set me straight on the best ways to send out information, how to engage families, and how to help their children thrive.

In the middle of my second year at FHJC everything changed – COVID closed most in-person activities, including religious services and Religious School. It also forced us to update our relationship with

technology and gave us a fresh perspective on the importance of community. I was so inspired by FHJC members who literally risked their lives to pick up groceries for fellow members. The FHJC community showed me the meaning of chesed.

And that was just the start. Acts of chesed and tzedakah (in the literal sense of righteousness) proliferated! We made art with seniors, (you can still see it under the LIRR trestle crossing Yellowstone), cleaned beaches, fed hungry people with sandwiches and soup mix. We learned together what it means to celebrate diversity, equity and inclusion at FHJC. What a blessing to be able to facilitate this powerful force for good.

Together we have danced at Simchat Torah, celebrated b'nei mitzvah, watched some great TV, froze our patooties at Havdallahs in the alley and shared so many joyous moments. And we have weathered the transition of both clergy members. We have survived the sale of this property. We grapple with the loss of loved ones, including the loss of my mother. And now we are faced with increased antisemitism and Israel at war.

I know that despite all of this, FHJC will continue to be a welcoming haven and a dynamic leader in the community. How can I be so sure? Because we have learned together that FHJC isn't one person or one place. It's a community that can get through hard stuff and still thrive because our strength comes from within our unity. And, even though I am leaving the staff of FHJC, I still consider myself blessed to be part of this amazing and resilient community.

I am a mother, a wife, grandmother (aka Gamma Rae), a sister and a friend. I am also a daughter, although that role is mostly based on memories and saying Kaddish. And, I am a committed Jew and Zionist.

I am a member of an incredible community, the Forest Hills Jewish Center, which has supported me in times of great joy and devastating sorrow. I am also a member of our Sisterhood, and the Sisterhood Presidium. I have the honor and pleasure of serving with a group of smart, funny, compassionate and dedicated women on the Sisterhood Board, and have also come to know women from our BQLI region and women across the country from the Women's League International Convention.

All these components of my identity are theft-proof. Despite all the frustrations, uncertainties and complications we all face every day, it is comforting to remind ourselves that some things can never be stolen from us.


