FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Get ready, 'cause here it comes!

Shalom friends,

Judaism has a lot of books! These include of course the Torah, the Talmud, the works of midrash, and codes of *halakha* (Jewish law). The Jewish books we hold most often, though, are our prayer books. The prayer book we use day to day and week to week is the Siddur, whose name derives from the order (seder) that the prayers have been carefully arranged into for regular use. As we head into Autumn and the approaching High Holidays that start the Jewish year, we will take out the Machzor, our prayer book specifically for these important days.

The word Machzor means "cycle" and comes from the hebrew root ¬-ī-¬, which means "to return." Originally, machzorim included services for every day of the year's calendrical cycle, which is the source of their name. There are machzorim for Pesach and Sukkot, but the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur prayer book is the one that has earned the title Machzor in the popular imagination. It may be due to the Hebrew calendar starting at Rosh Hashanah setting off the cycle of the year, but I think there's a deeper connection.

In another important Jewish book, the Shulchan Aruch, it states that one should review the prayers before the holidays so that they will be fluent on your tongue (O.H. 100). "To review" comes from the same Hebrew root as machzor. It's not hard to understand why one needed to brush up on the prayers said only once a year in a world with few printed books and most prayers recited from memory. By spending some time before the holiday itself preparing, the words will be easier to remember and the Jew-with-review will hopefully have a strong connection on Yom Kippur.

Still, more than just a reminder of the words on the page, turning back to review the ideas of repentance and sacred reflection are core themes of our holiest days. We look back at the year and evaluate where we succeeded in being our best selves, and where we missed the mark. We review who we aim to be, where we are on our path to get there, and return our focus and commitment to necessary self-refinement. By doing so, we are chozrim biTshuvah, those who return through repentance.

While we no longer require the time to review the liturgy thanks to the printing press, there is still a need and benefit to putting in some prep time for the holidays, even when you're not the rabbi. The spiritual uplift and moral course-correction which we strive for this time of year is aided by the Hazzan's powerful melodies, the Rabbi's sermon, and the sounding of the shofar, but there is only so much that can be done from the outside when the process is internal. That is why many take time before Rosh Hashanah to contact friends, family, and even enemies to apologize and make amends. It is why I encourage the soul-searching process or cheshbon hanefesh, which can include choosing character traits to focus on building or removing in the next year. It can be as simple as sitting and thinking, so long as we actually take the time to do

May the year ahead of us be one of peace for the Jewish people and the world! My children and I wish you a happy, healthy, and sweet new year!

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NOTES FROM THE HAZZAN

The most beloved liturgical poem of the High Holiday liturgy is without a doubt the well-known *Unetaneh* Tokef prayer, with its dramatic depiction of the Heavenly Court, with the Almighty serving as judge, arbiter, witness and scribe. Scholars note that this allegory reflects the three major themes of Rosh Hashanah liturgy: Malchuyot, Zichronot, and Shofarot, which are also the names of the three additional prayer structures that form the core of the Rosh Hashanah Musaf Amidah. These monumental collections of biblical verses and their surrounding benedictions are referred to collectively as Tekiata d'Rav, so-named after their author, the Talmudic sage "Rav" Abba Arikha. Though hearing the Shofar is most certainly a type of worship in and of itself, the "Blasts of Rav"offer another paradigm of worship. Within each of these additions there are three distinct forms of religious expression: the biblical verses themselves, opening and closing benedictions, and the piyyutim, or poetic verses, repeated at the end of each service. The theological explanations for these additions are commonly framed as three distinct ways to imagine God.

Inspired by my teacher Zvi Zahavy's book, God's Favorite Prayers (pun intended), I began to imagine these prayers as not only representative of God's divine attributes, but also as a representation of how we imagine ourselves and our relationship to God and to the Jewish people (In my recent studies I was pleased to learn that the medieval author Isaac Arama viewed the different shofar blasts themselves as representing different types of people!).

Within each of these miniature "services" are a myriad of opportunities for every "Jew in the pew" to approach God and Judaism. The opening

benedictions, Alenu, Ata Zocher, and Ata Nigleta, each provide a distinct portal to our Jewish identity. The first, Malchuyot, speaks for those whose relationship to Judaism is first and foremost theological in nature. The biblical verses of Malchuyot are preceded by Alenu, during which we prostrate ourselves to the one true God. The biblical verses themselves culminate with the ultimate expression of Jewish revelation, the Sh'ma, followed by a blessing that contains within it a formula that identifies this section as "Kedushat Hayom," the sanctification of the day, and concluding with "melech al kol Ha'aretz, m'kadesh Yisrael v'yom HaZiKaron," "King over all (of) the land who sanctifies Israel and the Day of Remembrance."

The second addition, Zichronot, has broad appeal for the observant and the cultural Jew. Its introduction, Ata Zocher, is an expansive exposition of the Zichronot verses, and for the High Holiday season as a whole. Remembrance here, though, foreshadows the upcoming Yom Kippur, and its associated rituals. This theme of remembering is indeed powerful, serving as a way in which we keep those we love, both living and deceased, close to us. We remember our fathers, mothers, grandparents, favorite aunts and childhood friends. We want our children to remember them, too. Jewishness is, for most of us, inextricably linked to our inner essence. Some of us also relate strongly through our personal and home observances, such as kashrut, and study -- those things that bind us to our ancestors. We also relate to Judaism through family simchas, food, books, and movies. The summation of the verses contained in the concluding benediction of

FROM THE PRESIDENT

The year 5784 was very eventful for us Jews - many would say too eventful - and there's a great deal of anxiety as we prepare for 5785. Rae and I were fortunate to be able to visit family and friends in Israel in July and we heard and felt some of the trauma the country is experiencing. On the one hand, while walking through Jerusalem, there was little to indicate a war was being fought not far away. Shops were open, plenty of people were on the streets, in buses and on the light rail, museums and tourist sites were busy. On the other hand, posters of the captives were everywhere, along with what seems to be the new national slogan: יחד ננצח - together we will win. It's a wonderful concept and applies equally well for American Jews.

My nephews live in Tel Aviv. Rae's college buddies live in Haifa, Jerusalem and Ma'ale Adumim. Yet Israel is a small country, and everyone knows someone who's on active duty or has just returned from duty. Everyone also knows someone who was caught up in the horror Hamas brought about in October. Their heartbreak is intense and enduring and will not have any measure of relief until every last captive has been brought home. I regret that we weren't able to visit some of the organizations that are doing so much to help ease the suffering of families who lost loved ones, such as OneFamily and Zaka, but we were given a tour of Magen

David Adom's new National Blood Center in Ramla. The word impressive doesn't do justice to this incredible national asset that stores a huge number of units of whole blood, platelets and serum of many different types, along with associated medical supplies, deep underground, for emergencies.

The need to prepare for eventual war with Hezbollah while assisting the many people who had to abandon their homes in the north is a very perceptible undercurrent in Israeli society and causes much pain and uncertainty. The solidarity of the nation is being tested as never before but will triumph.

Going into this High Holiday season we have especially poignant reasons to pray – for ourselves and all our family in Israel. And we have an equally urgent need to make peace between us, remove any divisions and resolve petty issues. Let us continue to make the Forest Hills Jewish Center a true center where all Jews are welcomed warmly and made to feel part of the community so that we, too, can say NIT LELY INT.

I look forward to greeting each of you and wishing you a Shanah Tova, a year of peace and good health, in which all of our prayers are answered.



Zichronot reference our ancestors coming out of slavery in Egypt. The closing section is a special b'racha to a God who, like us, remembers the covenant.

The opening of Shofarot, Ata Nigleta, also conjures up communal memory, peering far back into our past, recalling revelation at Sinai. In Shofarot, though, we are no longer considering only the past, but rather turning our gaze to the future. During much of the Diaspora, this was said to be the most popular of the three additions, as it related to freedom and the eventual return to the Promised Land, expressing a culmination of the two previous Tekiatot, and of our eventual salvation and redemption from exile. Now that a Jewish homeland has been realized, these verses are infused with new meaning, and these verses relate to our strong personal relationship with Israel, and our sense of Jewish unity. Being a "Shofarot Jew" does not limit our identity to the cause of Israel. Shofarot calls upon us to take action, both in our community and also in the world at large; a clarion call to right the injustices of the world, and to stand up for those who cannot stand up for themselves, including our brethren here at home and in Israel. The uplifting nature of Shofarot culminates with a blessing not only to a God who hears our Shofar, but one who hears our Shofar, b'rachamim, in mercy.

Whether your connection to Judaism is theological, cultural, or redemptive, ultimately, we may be called upon at any moment to embrace any (or all of) the three. May the coming season be a time of reflection, transformation, and joy for us all.
